Time on the Rosebud

In early June, nineteen folks from FCC and Plymouth UCC traveled to the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota, where we continued deepening relationships with our friends and mission partners from the Rosebud Episcopal Mission. While there, we participated in a number of work projects which included sanding and painting an accessibility ramp and covering graffiti at Church of Jesus, Rosebud; cleanup and repair of Barbour Hall and Grace Chapel, Mission; clean up of the guild hall and drawing and staking the footprint of the new building at Holy Innocents, Parmelee (where we also visited the pews donated by FCC after their fire); turtle rescue in the middle of the highway; and cleaning up the wood barn and chopping firewood at the Bishop Hare Center, Mission. On each day of our trip, we had the opportunity to learn about Lakota history, heritage, and culture from the Lakota people. Highlights of our cultural experiences were learning Lakota hand games, making fry bread, and learning about sweat lodges. We also earned the first-ever SUPER Gumby Award, awarded for our ability to remain SUPER flexible!

We are so grateful for the ways in which our friends on the Rosebud continue to share their experiences and traditions with us in ways that shape how our youth walk in the world. We are also grateful for Mother Lauren Stanley, who took time away from her job as Canon to the Ordinary to accompany us. If you haven't already, we invite you to watch the June 9th worship service where we shared the ways in which our time on the Rosebud brought about personal transformation for all

who attended.
